WEEKLY PRINT & DIGITAL LITURGICAL PROGRAMS

- † Mass Readings
 - **Present to November 28, 2020** · In response to the coronavirus pandemic, gratis permission has been granted by the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine [CCD] to reprint readings in weekly print and digital liturgical programs. No paid licenses are required.
 - November 29, 2020 onward · On the First Sunday of Advent, paid licenses will again be required to reprint readings in English for weekly print and digital liturgical programs. To obtain a license, email the CCD's Associate Director for Permissions (currently, nabperm@usccb.org) with the following information: contact person, parish name, parish address, phone number, number of copies printed each week, proposed start date. For more information, visit https://www.usccb.org/offices/new-american-bible/permissions.
- Mass Prayers · No license is required for reprinting texts of *The Roman Missal* in a liturgical program for one-time use at a specific Mass, provided that (a) the publication is produced by the parish, school, or institution rather than by a publishing firm and (b) that the publication is not sold. The International Commission on English in the liturgy grants permissions to such institutions for this use. For reprinting texts of *The Roman Missal* in participation aids for more than one-time use (for example, an Order of Mass card developed and printed by a parish), no fee is assessed but written permission is required. To obtain permission, email the Secretariat of the International Commission on English in the Liturgy at permission. For more information, visit http://www.icelweb.org/copyright.htm.

- Prayers for Mass & Other Liturgies · For a one-time, special liturgy (such as Confirmation, Matrimony, Funeral, etc.), no license is required to reprint texts of *The Roman Missal* and other ritual books containing ICEL translations in a print liturgical program, provided that (a) the publication is produced by the parish, school, or institution rather than by a publishing firm and (b) that the publication is not sold. USE & ACKNOWLEDGMENT

In All Cases · The official liturgical text must be followed exactly. All excerpts must be verbatim from the text, including capitalization and punctuation. The poetic structure of readings written in verse (for example, Psalms, Wisdom, Isaiah, etc.) must be preserved in verse as printed. The appropriate acknowledgments must be printed in the liturgical program.

- August 15 Cardinal Sarah, Prefect Congregation for Divine Worship, issues letter *Let Us Return to the Eucharist with Joy!* to presidents of bishops' conferences
- August 27 World Council of Churches & Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue release Serving a Wounded World: A Christian Call to Reflection and Action during COVID-19 and Beyond
- September 1 Pope Francis gives his Message for the Fourth World Day of Prayer for Creation
- September 29 Pope Francis announces theme of the 55th World Day of Social Communications to take place in May 2021—"Come and See"
- September 30 Pope Francis publishes the Apostolic Letter Scripturae Sacrae Affectus on the sixteenth hundredth anniversary of the death of St Jerome
- October 3 Pope Francis signs the Encyclical Letter Fratelli tutti on fraternity and social friendship at the tomb of St Francis of Assisi

Chapter One: Dark Clouds over a Closed World. Applying the seejudge-act method to assess the situation of the world, identifying specific issues familiar in Francis' writings, e.g., human dignity, migration, dangers of a "throwaway culture," globalization, social media/communications, etc.

Chapter Two: A Stranger on the Road. Reflecting on the parable of the good Samaritan, the biblical basis for remaining chapters.

Chapter Three: Envisioning and Engendering an Open World. Explaining that love opens us up beyond ourselves, & human beings are not meant to be self-sufficient islands but are called to encounter. The pope addresses principles such as solidarity, liberty, equality, human rights, property rights.

Chapter Four: A Heart Open to the Whole World. Applying the discussion on openness brought by love & the corresponding principles to issues faced in today's world, e.g., migration, relationship between cultures, relationship of local & universal.

Chapter Five: A Better Kind of Politics. Now applying the above to politics, especially as it relates to the common good. The pope addresses liberalism, populism, & political power. He then provides an explanation of "political charity" / "political love."

Chapter Six: Dialogue and Friendship in Society. Reflecting on a society built on mutual dialogue & friendship, drawn out through love, solidarity, truth, encounter, joy, & kindness. It includes some basic practical actions for such a society, e.g. expressions of gratitude, basic politeness, etc.

Chapter Seven: Paths of Renewed Encounter. Calling all to heal open wounds. The pope addresses the path to peace, which begins in truth & requires forgiveness. He then addresses the major challenges facing the path to peace, especially conflict, war, & the death penalty.

Chapter Eight: Religions at the Service of Fraternity in our World. Affirming of our Christian identity while acknowledging the contribution of other religions & the role they play in a more peaceful, fraternal world.
