What is the process for dealing with allegations of sexual abuse of a minor?

- All allegations are reported immediately to legal authorities.
- The Diocese cooperates fully with any law enforcement investigation.
- All allegations are forwarded to the diocesan Victim Assistance Coordinator so that outreach to the alleged victim-survivor can be offered.
- After a prompt internal initial investigation, if the allegation meets a preliminary threshold of credibility, the accused cleric is placed on administrative leave.
- An announcement is published at parishes and any diocesan institution where the accused cleric served.
- When the diocesan review is complete, all evidence is considered by the Diocesan Review Board, which consists mostly of lay men and women.
- The Review Board determines whether the allegation is credible and advises the Bishop regarding the accused cleric's suitability for ministry. (No cleric with a credible allegation of sexual abuse against a minor may return to ministry.)
- If an act of child abuse by the accused cleric is admitted or established, the Bishop will take appropriate canonical action, up to and including laicization.
